- Carolyn Fortuna and Jeff Rossi now co-chair the Ways and Means Committee. Their job is to suggest schemes that may raise at least \$5,000, the GHS FY2007 budget bottom line.
- Tom Carrazzo now chairs the newly created Community Outreach Committee. His Job is to conceive of ways to inform all segments of Glocester of the work of the GHS and to attract community input (among other goals).
- A meeting with Acotes Cemetery Association has settled the issue of property boundaries around the Pettingell/Mason House. Now, the GHS in collaboration with the DOT can configure restoration of the yard.
- The Board of Directors has been holding weekly workshops to plan for the June 23 Dorr March event, whose goal is two-fold: to raise in the consciousness of Rhode Islanders the significant contribution that Thomas Dorr has made to the State's rich history; and to gather in funds that will enable the GHS to pay an architect's \$50,000 fee—step one in restoring the rooms of the Pettingell/Mason House.
- The GHS is inviting bids to repair weather damage to the north wall and windows of the Job Armstrong Store.

TREASURER'S REPORT BY LAUREN E. ANDREWS

You have probably noticed while traveling Route 44, a dearth in construction activity at the Reuben Mason House. The reasons? We are moving from Phase 1 to Phase 2, or from completion of structural and exterior work to the startup of interior work. Involved are a number of issues such as: resolution of a few remaining Phase 1 items on a punch list; preparation of plans and specs and establishment of bidding procedures for Phase 2. Lastly, and most importantly, there is fundraising.

We have a policy that we do not start a new phase until all required funding has been obtained. To date, we have spent about \$275,000 with approximately \$200,000 remaining to spend in order to complete. Fifty thousand dollars of the remaining \$200,000, we have on hand with another \$50,000 available subject to match funding. One hundred thousand dollars will fulfill our match funding requirements and also complete Phase 2. At this point, the building will start to look like the museum it is eventually intended to be.

In the meantime, we look to our readers, subscribers, members, friends, and all those who believe in the significance of historic preservation to join us in this last lap effort to raise \$100,000 from the community. We look forward to your support.

DORR REBELLION REMEMBERED AND REENACTED ON JUNE 23,2007 BY EDNA KENT

Thomas Wilson Dorr, champion of our voting rights and the People's Party leader, which elected him Rhode Island governor in 1842, will again have his message heard in Glocester.

The Dorr Rebellion, which ended in Chepachet in June 1842, will be remembered on June 23, 2007 as militia troops retrace the march into Chepachet from three directions. Brief reenactments will take place at the future Dorr Rebellion Museum (field hospital for the state's troops) 1043 Putnam Pike and Tavern-on-the-Main (which was Dorr's headquarters).

Militias will assemble to parade with fife and drums to the Baptist Church where speakers will reveal Dorr's struggle for our voting rights, and musical selections will be presented by Atwater/Donnelly.

Chowder and clam cakes and other food concessions will be open from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. at the Baptist Church serenaded by music from the Heritage String Band. "Sutlers'" tents selling period wares will be at Town Hall.

This is a fund-raising event to support the interior completion of the future Dorr Rebellion Museum at the Pettingell/Mason house east of Acote's Hill.

On page 8 of the Executive Summary (Rhode Island State Land Use Policies and Plan), a photo of the Pettingell/Mason House, while undergoing renovation, is featured. Then, on page 15 of the Champlin Foundation 2006 Annual Report, we read:

The Rueben Mason House, built in 1745, was home to Mason, a surgeon during the Revolutionary War. The building was also used as a military hospital during an 1842 rebellion led by Thomas Dorr to expand voting rights in Rhode Island. It continues as a landmark, anchoring the eastern approach to historic Chepachet Village in the Town of Glocester.

A 2003 grant of \$80,000 toward the cost of the exterior renovations and a \$50,000 award this year will help to restore the interior of the building.
