### "Behind the Scenes"

Our February meeting was a banner evening with Dr. Clifford Brown, political science professor at Union College, Schenectady, N.Y., who held us spellbound with "Behind the Scenes" – President Tyler's role in controlling the 1842 Dorr Rebellion. Several LaSalle students jotted notes for their history reports, and participation from the audience elicited even more fascinating facts in a Q&A session at the end. The room hummed with inspired discussion well after the program was finished. Refreshments were served by our ever – congenial hostess, Glennis Beltram.

## From an unpublished text by Gardis Thayer

### "Dorr Rebellion..."

Charles Slocum was one of the Dorrites. (his wife) Lydia Olney Slocum was heart & soul with him and proof of her loyalty, named her baby daughter born that time – CANDACE DORR WILSON SLOCUM" (The Lydia Slocum house is now "The Town Trader")

Historian's note: Since deeds do not reveal a land transition during the 18th Century it is likely that the building was passed down in the Olney family to Lydia who married Charles Slocum in 1833, Lydia's great-grandfather was Capt. Joseph Olney whose daughter, Dorcas married Dr. Reuben Mason. When Dorcas died, Dr. Mason's and Dorcas' only son James came to live with Capt. Joseph Olney and Esther (Smith) Olney, in the house now known as the Town Trader.

## Letter from Elizabeth Mullins

*1981 (Owner of a gristmill in West Gloucester)*

*"I would have  
liked to have seen  
Nelson Plant's  
gristmill restored...  
Its first location  
was in Pascoag.  
I was told by  
Everett Burlingame  
that his father  
bought it from,  
I believe, Frank  
Sayles and moved*

*it to the Burlingame place. Neighbors... helped him reassemble it.  
Burlingame Reservoir was its source of power...  
an up-and-down sawmill (was) there...*

*In 1936 I bought the Eddy Pray farm, formerly owned by S.S. Sweet  
on Old Gristmill Road, West Gloucester. The original house was gone,  
but gristmill & carriage shop, barn still survived.*

*1870 Atlas (shows 6 gristmills): John Steere, A. Hawkins & Son,  
J. Peckham, S.M. Paine, Nelson Plante and mine.*

*Nelson had a stand on Rt 44 at the road to his place. We bought honey,  
jellies, blueberries, vegetables and cornmeal from him...*

*On one visit to the mill the cobwebs were covered with a green...  
powder.. (He was) grinding alfalfa for a doctor in Riverside who made  
alfalfa tablets for his patient."*

The state of Rhode Island purchased the property to preserve it. However, the buildings presented a liability and all were destroyed.

First person historical information like this expands the knowledge of the town's history.
