Sledding to Providence

"I remember an especially big blizzard near the end of the war... 1918. The snow covered our 4 1/2 foot-high picket fence and the trolley was shut down for days... The Pascoag branch train also had trouble getting out our way. My sister Amey was attending Brown University and.. was allowed only a certain number of 'cuts'." Snowbound, she might fail her courses, so she decided to walk to Providence (18 miles). Cousin Edna Paine, who worked in Providence agreed to make the trip with her.

With a sled and food, they set out over the surface of the hard encrusted snow. Their plan was to walk up the hills and slide down the other side. On the level, one pulled, the other rode.

They walked down Putnam Pike to Absalona Hill and slid down to Bessie Phillips' farm, walked, then slid down into Harmony. In Greenville they slid down Barnes Hill and "probably stopped for hot chocolate at Walcott's" (now Apple Valley Mall).

Leaving their sled at Chadwick's House in Greystone, they "walked into Centerdale and found that the trolley was running to Providence. Amey passed her courses, and Edna got to work, both staying with friends until trolley service to Chepachet resumed."
